[Session Presentations](#). Share your expertise in preparing students for civic life. Sessions will be 45 minutes.

Proposals should include: submitter's name, contact information/email, institutional affiliation, presentation title, a 50- word overview of your presentation, target audience, and connection to conference theme.

[KCSS Graduate & Faculty Roundtables](#). The roundtable forum is an opportunity for faculty, graduate students, and other emerging scholars to discuss their research and receive feedback.

Roundtables will be thematically organized to allow participants to engage with peers with similar interests.

- We encourage research from many facets of education research, as well as the several disciplines of social studies and the humanities.

Following the individual paper summaries (approximately 10 minutes per paper), discussion will ensue in order to explore questions pertaining to the research and gain constructive feedback from colleagues. Discussion will be led by a [designated discussant](#), but is meant to include all table members.

Proposals should include: submitter's name, contact information/email, institutional affiliation, a 250- word abstract of the paper (with title), and a brief biographical statement indicating your academic status.

[Elementary/Middle/High School Student Presentations](#). The student presentations will be an opportunity for elementary, middle, and high school students to present on research or projects related to the conference theme. We encourage students to share ways in which they have applied their classroom learning to a civic context.

Proposals should include: submitter's name, contact information/email, institutional affiliation, a 250- word abstract of the presentation (with title) connecting the research/project to the conference theme, and a brief biographical statement indicating your academic status.

Discussants. Discussants for the [roundtables](#) or [student presentations](#) will read the submitted work and prepare questions for discussion. [Student discussants](#) are welcomed (and encouraged!) for the student presentations. This is a great opportunity for your students to showcase their work!
